### RICCARDO UNCUT (2018) BY EVA AND FRANCO MATTES LAUNCH ON THE WHITNEY'S ARTPORT

NEW YORK, MAY 8, 2018 - Today, Riccardo Uncut by Eva and Franco Mattes debuts on artport, the Whitney's portal to Internet art and online gallery space for commissions of net art.

For this project, the artists posted an offer on social media to buy someone's phone for \$1,000, including all the photos and videos contained therein. The artists would turn the purchased materials into an uncensored archive of someone's life, accessible to the public as a chronological slideshow. The resulting work, consisting of approximately 3,000 images taken between 2004 and 2017, documents the daily life of Riccardo, including friends, family, travel, sexual desire, food, and art.

Christiane Paul, adjunct curator of new media arts, said, "The piece investigates how individuals construct digital memory and whether a photo can truly be private in the digital age. Social media creates the opportunity to perform an idealized version of oneself. With Riccardo Uncut, the artists investigate whether one might find authentic self-representation in an unedited archive."

The sale was also a central conceptual element of the project. The phone owner's willingness to sell the raw documentation of his personal life mirrors agreeing to the terms of service of social media platforms.

*Riccardo Uncut* continues Eva and Franco Mattes's ongoing investigations of privacy, transparency, voyeurism, and exhibitionism pursued in *Life Sharing* (2000–2003) and *The Others* (2011).

### **About the Artists**

Eva and Franco Mattes (b. 1976, Italy) are based in New York. Their work has been shown at the 20th Biennale of Sydney, Sydney, Australia; Electronic Superhighway and Artists' Film International, Whitechapel Gallery, London, England; Big Bang Data, Somerset House, London, England; Royal Museums of Fine Arts of Belgium, Brussels, Belgium; Performa, New York, USA; MoMA PS1, New York, USA; New Museum, New York, USA; NTT ICC Museum, Tokyo, Japan; Manifesta, Frankfurt, Germany; and the Venice Biennale, Venice, Italy.
